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The Body



Read 1 Corinthians 12:12-31

Paul writes in the context of the gifts of the Spirit. In 1 Corinthians 12 Paul gives three separate lists of the gifts of the Spirit (12:8-10;28 and 29-30). Paul describes them collectively as gifts, services and works. Paul argues that all the gifts of the Spirit are equal, all are necessary and none should be considered inferior.



What would you imagine they considered the most important gift?

You may have answered Apostle 28; 29 or prophet 10; 28, 29 but they would have answered tongues. The Corinthian church seems to have valued tongues as the ultimate expression of spirituality and to have spoken in tongues in public meetings almost to the exclusion of everything else. Paul writes 1 Corinthians 12-14 to counter this imbalance.



Do we value speaking in tongues?

Probably today we undervalue speaking in tongues. Some people have misunderstood this part of Corinthians, thinking that Paul is devaluing the gifts of tongues and discouraging its use. This is not the case, he is simply calling for balance 1 Corinthians 14:18, 39.

What Paul says in this passage should be read in the context of all the gifts of the Spirit and all of the functions needed in the church, what Paul calls services and works 1 Corinthians 12:4-6.

In 1 Corinthians 12:12-31 the Church is compared to a body. This is just one of many metaphors that are used to describe the church. Each one has a different emphasis, a different way of explaining who we are, how we function, and why we are here.



What do each of these emphasis?

What does being a body emphasis?

We belong to one another
We are a part of a whole
We need each other
Function comes from co-operation not individuality
We are not intended to all be the same
Within the whole diversity – God's plan
Equality within the body



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Just as a body, though one, has many parts, but all its many parts form one body, so it is with Christ. 1 Corinthians 12:12

What parts are there in the body? How many parts are there?



And so the body is not made up of one part but of many. 1 Corinthians 12:14

What would happen if we all had the same part to play in church? What would happen if we all had the same set of abilities?



Now if the foot should say, 'Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body,' it would not for that reason stop being part of the body. 1 Corinthians 12:15

Why would a foot say this?

How would the foot say this when it doesn't have a mouth?

What makes you think you are not part of the body?

It probably comes down to. Feeling different, feeling inferior, feeling superior or not seeing where you fit the whole.

Are any of these reasons to exclude yourself from the body?

According to this verse can a foot stop being a part of the body? Does the way a foot feel change whether it is a part of the body?

We all know that every church is a coalition of the willing. Anyone can leave at any time. The same was true in Paul's day. But to think this way misses the point.

What good is a foot without a leg? What good is a leg without a foot?

A foot needs a leg and a leg needs a foot. It is symbiotic. The leg loses function when the foot is missing and the foot loses purpose when it detaches. It becomes irrelevant.



If the whole body were an eye, where would the sense of hearing be? If the whole body were an ear, where would the sense of smell be? 1 Corinthians 12:17

What point is Paul making here?

Every part is needed and if it is missing leaves a deficiency.

What parts do we lack?



But in fact God has placed the parts in the body, every one of them, just as he wanted them to be. 1 Corinthians 12:18

Who chooses what part you are?



Do we get any say in the matter?

Why does God arrange the parts?

What is His goal?

If we are all different parts then is diversity a good thing or a bad thing?



As it is, there are many parts, but one body. 1 Corinthians 12:20

What implications does this have for us?

What makes it hard to be a body?

Why do you think Paul needed to remind the Corinthians of this?

This implies that we need to work together, be united, and work for the common good.



The eye cannot say to the hand, 'I don't need you!' And the head cannot say to the feet, 'I don't need you!' 1 Corinthians 12:21

Why would the eye say this?

We tend to think that our gift, talent or job is the most important. We understand our part but not necessarily the part of others. The eye thinks like an eye, it does not think like a hand. This is natural and quite normal.

What change in perspective are we being asked to make?



On the contrary, those parts of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable and the parts that we think are less honourable we treat with special honour. And the parts that are unpresentable are treated with special modesty, while our presentable parts need no special treatment. 1 Corinthians 12:22-24



What do you think of as the weaker parts? What makes them indispensable? How do you treat them with honour?

What might make a part unpresentable? How do we treat them with special modesty?

It may be anyone you think of as embarrassing for some reason or another. A body covers it unpresentable parts with clothes, we have to do it with acceptance and protection. An example might be how we treat people with additional needs or those who are sick or perhaps destitute.



But God has put the body together, giving greater honour to the parts that lacked it, 1 Corinthians 12:24

If God has done this how should we react?

So that there should be no division in the body, 1 Corinthians 12:25

This is a continuation of what Paul has said in the previous verse. If we treat the weak with honour and consider the needs of all then we will be in unity.

What kind of unity is Paul encouraging here?



If one part suffers, every part suffers with it; if one part is honoured, every part rejoices with it. 1 Corinthians 12:26

How does this work out practically?

What kind of suffering might a member of the body endure?

What kind of a picture of the church is Paul presenting? Is it realistic?
